# Overview

### PEOPLE. PLACES. PARTNERSHIPS.

Campus Calgary / Open Minds is an experience like no other. It provides opportunities for Calgary students and their teachers to experience an immersive 5-day field study at various vibrant community sites across our city. CC/OM brings the community together to meet the unique learning needs of today's students. Over 150,000 students have engaged in this way of learning since its inception, which all started with an idea and a dream. Don Harvie, a well-known Calgary philanthropist, and Gillian Kydd, a specialist with the Calgary Board of Education science team, worked together to create what eventually became Zoo School. Gillian believed that one week at the Calgary Zoo would be rich with learning and could be a catalyst for a year-long study. Thus, Zoo School was born, bringing students and their teachers into vibrant community settings for immersive week-long field studies.

Since that time, the Calgary Board of Education and the Calgary Catholic School District have collaborated with corporate Calgary and local community venues to bring high-quality and immersive experiences to Calgary students and their teachers. This education model is celebrating its 32nd year of excellence and innovation, bringing personalized learning programs to students. Campus Calgary / Open Minds provides a dynamic learning experience by taking students into the community and connecting them to experts who are passionate about experiential learning.

This year, 240 teachers and over 6200 students participated in Campus Calgary / Open Minds for a year of inspired learning. Site coordinators continued to use much creativity and innovation to create meaningful and rigorous site-based experiences for classes.

Passionate educators and experts at community sites continued to offer fascinating, educationally rich opportunities that engaged students in hands-on discovery, exploration, and reflection. Each CC/OM site offers a unique lens with which to uncover and examine curriculum. These dynamic experiences continue to make learning meaningful for students because they are engaged in authentic educational activities that allow them to make personal connections that will have lasting impacts. Campus Calgary / Open Minds creates an inquiry driven environment that allows teachers to gain a deeper understanding of students' skills, knowledge, and aptitudes. This enhances critical-thinking and problem-solving skills related to all curricular disciplines, and facilitates a deeper understanding of community, responsibility, cultural awareness, civic pride, and stewardship.

Students gain confidence as learners and engaged thinkers while seeing that they can make a positive impact through enhanced creativity, innovation, and communication. The CC/OM experience truly opens the minds of students giving each one a clearer understanding of their role within a bigger picture. Students become more connected to their community and take up current issues which push their knowledge beyond their local setting to national and global communities.

A Campus Calgary / Open Minds week is a time for students to ask questions, have meaningful conversations with experts in the community, slow down and reflect, journal and to sketch, and to make sense of the world around them. It is not a week in isolation, but rather a week that is a catalyst to a myriad of connections to personal experiences and classroom learning.

CC/OM has the potential to be a life-changing experience for teachers and students. It embraces a life-long and personalized approach to learning, personal management and well-being, literacy development, citizenship, and generates effective relationships with the community at large. Students,

teachers, parents, experts, and community organizations learn alongside one another.

The program is unique for its length, prioritization of deep thinking and first-hand experiences that transcend curricular outcomes, time to slow down and reflect, and the ongoing professional learning for teachers. Campus Calgary / Open Minds experiences truly transform learning to its highest levels.

### **PILOT SITES FOR 24-25**

It was wonderful to welcome new sites to Campus Calgary / Open Minds as pilots. Working with coordinators and other site personnel to create Pilots for Contemporary Calgary Art Studio, Outdoor Leadership School, and Youth Singers School provided opportunities to formalize some Pilot Site Structures, including professional learning for pilot teachers, surveys for teachers, Operations Team, students, and pilot site coordinators. Debrief meetings were also integral to provide feedback in a timely manner. It's exciting that all three pilot sites are continuing as pilot sites for the 2025-2026 school year.

## **DIVERSE LEARNERS & CC/OM**



# **Sharing Our Story**

This school year provided opportunities to share and celebrate Campus Calgary / Open Minds story in a variety of ways. Firstly, City Hall School celebrated 25 years and secondly, the stories which teachers share in their Application Supporting Documents as to why they want a Campus Calgary / Open Minds experience, for themselves and their students.

### Celebrating 25 years of City Hall School • By: Jenelle de Jesus

This year marks the 25th anniversary of City Hall School in Calgary! Acknowledging this milestone requires reflection on the journey that brought us to this place in time – from an idea, to a pilot site, to a full-time program in a permanent place on the main floor of the municipal building here in Calgary – City Hall School has involved students (and adults!) in learning about local government, what it means to be an engaged citizen and how these pieces have a direct impact on their lives as Calgarians.

City Hall School was officially launched in March 2000, beginning with six pilot classes and Coordinator Diane Murray laying the foundation for the program. The City had transformed a committee room into a classroom, located on the main floor, giving the public a glimpse into how young people can engage in learning about municipal government and civic engagement.

Over the years, City Hall School has shaped a legacy of educating youth in the city. Some of the achievements include:

 2002: Campus Calgary / Open Minds City Hall School receives 2002 Mayor's Excellence Award – Calgary Partnerships in Education Foundation – City Hall School: Professional Development Award

- 2014: Celebrates 10,000 students taking part in the program
- 2020: City Hall School shifts to connecting with students virtually, due to COVID-19 pandemic, and continues to engage students in community.
   This includes a collaboration with Jube School for a project titled the Gratitude Project
- 2021: City Hall School returns to in-person learning
- 2025: City Hall School celebrates 25 years of programming and over 17,000 students participating

Those early years helped to form the cornerstones of the program that continue today. Each week, students have the opportunity to attend a meeting in the Council Chambers, meet Calgary's Mayor and their Councillor, and connect with city employees and community experts. These experiences connect to their yearlong big question and have classes understanding more about how decisions are made, as well as the impact that those decisions have on themselves and their communities.

To celebrate the occasion, we hosted a gathering where students, previous teachers and Coordinators, delegates, city employees, Campus Calgary/ Open Minds staff, school board representatives, and community experts came together to share stories and reflect on the impact that the program had and continues to have on youth in Calgary.

### **Application Supporting Document**

Teachers applying for Campus Calgary / Open Minds are asked a series of questions that include what their big idea or question is and how this experience will impact both them and their students. Here is a small sample of some of the stories that teachers shared with us on the applications this year.

What is your Big Idea or Question or Provocation and how do you see this influencing your year's work?

- How does human ingenuity affect our shared spaces to build strong communities?
- How can we cultivate genuine empathy for others in a global community and how can this empathy drive change in ourselves and others?
- How can we incorporate the teaching of the medicine wheel to promote health and well-being in our daily lives?
- What is the meaning of home?
- "How do stories shape our understanding of ourselves, others, space and place?"
- What can we do today to make tomorrow better?

What do you hope and/or want students to come to understand as part of this Campus Calgary / Open Minds experience?

- We hope for our students to come to understand the interconnectedness of home, community, and city.
   The connection between all three are like the ripples in a pond – they all influence each other even though we may not see it directly all the time.
- We want our students to recognize that choices and actions have power, and that part of their job as citizens is to engage their power in a positive manner.
- We want our learners to see the value of our past and how it has shaped who we are today with the tools we use, the systems we follow, and what we value.
- We would like students to understand that learning happens everywhere and that teachers are everywhere.



Campus Calgary / Open Minds is just as much for teachers as it is for students. With that in mind, what do you want to come to understand as part of this CC/OM experience?

- I think it's about time I stop sitting on the sidelines and just go for it. In the words of one of my favourite teachers "Take chances, make mistakes, get messy!"
- We want practices in place that will leave a legacy for our school, so that long after this program is done, it will continue in the following years.
- We believe that the Open Minds experience is irreplaceable for creating community, belonging, and understanding.

Why this site? How do you anticipate this site supporting your big question / idea / provocation and your students' yearlong learning?

- These students are our future scientists, and we hope that by igniting their early curiosity in math and science, they are inspired to activate their learning and continue to contribute to making this a better world for everyone.
- The site's commitment to accessibility ensures that all students have equal opportunities to participate fully in the learning experience, regardless of their abilities or backgrounds.
- It is not lost on us that these students have been missing the connection to the world around them.
   This cohort has been seeking belonging.

### Tell us about your students and school community.

- Our students come from diverse backgrounds through language, culture, family dynamics, history, and socioeconomic status. We want to allow them a place to build teamwork skills and cooperate.
- This experience would be impactful for our students and our school community because of the diversity of the students we teach...provide them with the opportunity to slow down, journal, and reflect on their learning. This opportunity can help develop awareness, tell their story, build human connection, and develop lifelong learning.
- This experience will help many students have an experience that they don't normally get to have. The kids wear their hearts on their sleeves, and the parents are so supportive of opportunities like this because they understand the importance of their children having experiences like this to grow and the lasting impact it can have on them.

# **Operations Team**

A Campus Calgary / Open Minds' week is a time to ask questions, have conversations with community experts, to slow down and reflect, to document, to journal, and to sketch. It is not a week in isolation, but rather a week that brings all classroom learning together. Students gain confidence as learners when learning is structured to capitalize on each student's interests, skills, and aptitudes. All stakeholders benefit from this educational model.

Representing both CBE and CCSD, the CC/OM Operations Team informs and supports the educational integrity of the program. # Advisory

The role of the Campus Calgary / Open Minds Advisory is to provide advice and support the day-to-day work of the Operations Team while anticipating and planning for the future needs of partners at community sites, at schools and education districts, as well as with funding partners.

Through the development of the CC/OM Advisory Road Map, we clarified our focus, being that of Stewardship, Community, and Decision Making. This Map is an anchor document that can be adapted and revised as necessary, based on changes in education and needs of sites and community. The map further clarifies advisory direction being about: Community Partnerships, Community Knowledge and Reputation, Sharing Through Story and Data, and Program Sustainability. These areas will continue to be the direction moving forward in 2025-2026.

### **Face-to-Face Meetings**

Every year, the CC/OM Operations Team and Advisory meet with our sites to discuss updates of the advisory and check in to see areas of support we can offer and to review programming. These are important conversations as they intentionally connect the various stakeholders involved in site schools, such as coordinators, their supervisors, other site personnel who are involved and support the CC/OM programming. Each CC/OM site is unique, bringing with them their own mission, vision, and guiding principles. Ongoing conversations are important to maintaining and supporting the integrity of Campus Calgary / Open Minds.

# The Coordinator Team

The Campus Calgary / Open Minds' Coordinator Team meets regularly alongside the Operations Team for Community of Practice conversations. These conversations focus on effective practice, designing intentional and purposeful tasks, and site-based learning opportunities for classes. Together, we collaborate to consider program opportunities and challenges and to engage together in meaningful collaborative conversations and learning.

This year the coordinator team contributed words that both inspired and shared their hopes for the upcoming year. These words became the intentions and throughlines for our time together at each coordinator meeting, weaving together individual hopes for collective learning and sharing.

- We celebrated all the opportunities and experiences of the year at Library School, as we finished the year with an incredible feeling of *Gratitude*.


At the close of every meeting, we asked everyone to share their 'takeaway thought or learning.'

# Professional Learning for Teachers

As part of a Campus Calgary / Open Minds experience, teachers have many Professional Learning opportunities throughout the year. We know that these Campus Calgary / Open Minds' experiences are for students, but they are also very much for teachers. Teachers consistently share that their work with the program results in enduring and meaningful change of practice. This change is the result of many touch points and ongoing communication.

### **CC/OM INFORMATION SESSIONS:**

Information Sessions are opportunities for new to CC/OM teachers to learn more about site experiences, the philosophy of our program, changes to application requirements, and the benefits of a field study experience. We hosted two presentations, at Teachers' Convention in the City Hall School classroom and one in April at Sweetgrass Lodge at Stampede Park.

### SITE-BASED PROFESSIONAL LEARNING:

Professional Learning includes Site-Based Experiences such as Spring Inservices, Summer Workshops, and Fall Pedagogy Sessions. The Spring In-service provides an opportunity for teachers to learn about the vibrant community site they will be working with. The Summer Workshop is an immersive experience where teachers are able to step into experiences similar to what they and their students will experience during their field study. The Fall Pedagogy Session provides an opportunity to learn more about the Journey into Journalling resource, a variety of sketching techniques, thinking routines, and how using a sketchbook can enhance a CC/OM experience and be beneficial throughout the school year.

### **PLANNING MEETINGS:**

Each teacher has a personalized planning meeting at their school with the site coordinator and a member of the Operations Team to discuss their big question, classroom complexities, anticipated curricular connections, and their hopes and dreams for their time on site. At each meeting teachers are given a chance to adapt and/or emphasize certain aspects of their application based on their experience with the classes that they have come to know more closely throughout the course of the year. Teachers are also encouraged to engage in journalling opportunities and reflections at school in preparation for their 5-day field study!

### **WORKSHOPS:**

Teachers are invited to participate in Professional Learning opportunities throughout the year that are reflective of trends in education and aligned with CC/OM philosophy and key elements. The feedback from participants was very valuable and validated that we have been very purposeful in creating Professional Learning opportunities that are authentic, responsive, and help to build capacity for teachers.



Through our experiences in CC/OM, we hope to develop a habit of reflective practice,

where we can critically examine our teaching methods, assess student learning outcomes, and identify areas for improvement."

**In-Person Workshops:** This year, we offered two in-person workshops, open to all participating teachers and the Campus Calgary / Open Minds' Team.

Our fall workshop on October 1st, "Coming to Know and Understand Communities as Places for Learning" was hosted at Bowcroft School in the North and Sibylla Kiddle School in the South. Teachers learned new and interesting ways to use their school's community as a place for exploration and community building, and to expand their Campus Calgary / Open Minds experience, making connections between their site and their own school communities. Participants also were provided with many resources about community learning opportunities.

Our winter workshop on March 11th, 'Sketchnotes with Sam Hester', was hosted at Telus Spark. We had the opportunity to work with local Calgary graphic artist Sam Hester, who led us through various strategies to create visual notes which can help to synthesize knowledge and make connections. Sketchnotes are a form of creative expression that improve focus, promote active listening, aid in recognizing connections, and promote being present and slowing down. Sketchnotes combine creativity and communication.

**Virtual Workshops:** We offered four virtual 45-minute Professional Learning sessions this year that shared a variety of topics. These virtual mini-sessions were:

- Coming to Know and Understand Communities as Places for Learning ONLINE RESOURCES - After hosting our in-person workshop titled: Coming to Know and Understand Communities as Places for Learning, we offered the opportunity to dig deeper into the resources that were shared more in depth, by members of the CC/OM team
- Hexagonal Thinking and Event Mapping In this workshop we explored how journalling and using various thinking
  routines help to make sense of the time on site and used throughout the school year in transdisciplinary ways.
   Participants learned how to use 'Hexagonal Thinking' and 'Event Mapping' to elicit deeper connection and thinking
  in students
- Connecting with the Importance of Journalling We shared the importance of journalling and how it can be part
  of participants everyday in-class practice, in addition to an integral part of the on-site experience. This workshop
  shared various ways journals can be used to engage students and share creativity
- Curiosity Chains and CSI: Colour Symbol Image Participants learned more about two of the Thinking Routines
  found in the Journey into Journalling resource. Curiosity Chains stimulate questions which lead to more
  observations, which lead to more questions, and so on. CSI: Colour, Symbol, Image provides opportunities for
  students to identify and distill the essence of ideas from reading, writing, viewing, or listening by using CSI to
  represent ideas

All of these workshops offered participants opportunities to learn new skills and have various touch points throughout the year with the Campus Calgary / Open Minds' community.

**POST-SECONDARY CONNECTIONS:** Teachers were offered opportunities to engage with a new thinking routine monthly, a info virtual session, and a 1hr co-taught cross-curricular journalling class for grades 1-6.

**DISTRICT BASED OPPORTUNITIES:** We always appreciate opportunities to connect with university teacher candidates about CC/OM. This year, we had the opportunity to work with both University of Calgary and Mount Royal University education classes, sharing CC/OM philosophy, task design, and engaged in journalling.


